Based on the systematic overview of [ETH Zurich on “Artificial Intelligence: Use of Licensed Full Text in Generative AI Tools”](#), the following table details what’s allowed and what’s not allowed with Wiley’s content.

<b>Permitted purposes</b>	✔ Non-commercial research, academic teaching, and learning purposes of authorized users.
<b>Use with open versions of AI tools</b>	✗ Not allowed if content is reused or shared.
<b>Use with closed versions of AI tools</b>	<p>⚠ Licensed content may be used in a closed AI system if it is operated locally or in a controlled environment and is accessible only to members of the institution.</p> <p>Content may be processed, analyzed, and used for the development of AI applications for non-commercial use.</p> <p>Some content is excluded from AI tool training and may not be used (see title list at end of this document). AI applications developed by members of the institution can be publicly shared under a non-commercial license, provided the applications are not able to generate content that violates Wiley's copyright.</p>
<b>Use with third party AI tools</b>	<p>⚠ Use of reputable third party providers’ tools is allowed, provided that licensed content is not used for training or enhancing the capabilities of the tool and is not reused or shared with other parties. Third party providers must be contractually bound to use the content exclusively for internal purposes, maintain confidentiality, and refrain from using it for training.</p>
<b>Open Access content</b>	✔ No restrictions for Open Access publications with a CC-BY license.
<b>Publication of AI-generated results</b>	<p>⚠ Results generated or developed using AI may be published and made accessible for research and teaching, provided they do not reproduce or contain licensed content from closed or CC-BY-NC-ND publications.</p>
<b>Commercial use</b>	✗ Commercial use of AI-generated content or platforms that use licensed media is not permitted.
